She has always made her own way and has had little regard for the current trends. "The Way it Feels" is her 9th studio album and is perhaps her best to date. It is imbued with an atmosphere that feels both natural and yet somehow otherworldly.

There are echoes of Americana, a bit of dark folk—a banjo and some pedal steel here and there—but it still feels very much like a Heather album with her distinctive vocals and great songwriting at its core.

APRIL 3 CARRIE RODRIGUEZ "THE SCARED HEART TOUR"

Jammin Java 7:30pm \$20 For Carrie Rodriguez and her musical partner Luke Jacobs, 2013 was an adventurous and revealing year. Putting over 14,000 miles on a rental van, the duo traveled coast to coast across the US in support of

Rodriguez' acclaimed Give Me All You Got. The album was well received by critics and fans alike reaching no. one on the Americana radio charts. Rodriguez and Jacobs also took their live show to Sweden, Norway, Germany, Italy, and the UK where in a glowing review of their performance the London Times noted, "Both performers engaged the audience with their personalities as well as their music...as they progressed on a richly rewarding journey." Jacobs' laid back vocals, blue-collar songs, and soulful pedal steel playing have proven to be the perfect compliment to Carrie's passion and intensity.

King presenting him with his award, and in 2012 he performed a special concert at the White House where he persuaded

President Barack Obama to join him at the vocal mic for a few choruses of "Sweet Home Chicago."

DAVID LINDLEY

Jammin Java 7:30pm \$22-30 Multi-instrumentalist David Lindley performs music that redefines the word "eclectic." Lindley, well known for his many years as the featured accompanist with Jackson Browne, and leader of his own band El Rayo-X, has long championed the concept of world music. The David Lindley electro-acoustic performance effortlessly combines American folk, blues, and bluegrass traditions with elements from African, Arabic, Asian, Celtic, Malagasy, and Turkish musical sources. Lindley incorporates an incredible array of stringed instruments including but not limited to Kona and Weissenborn Hawaiian lap steel guitar, Turkish saz and chumbus. Middle Eastern oud, and Irish bouzouki. The eye-poppingly clad "Mr. Dave's" uncanny vocal mimicry and demented sense of humor make his onstage banter a highlight of the show.





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




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A BLUES GIANT Comes to Wolf Trap

Blues-folk icon Chris Smither has long been revered for both his guitar prowess and his way with a lyric. To mark his 50th year in the music business, the performer released three noteworthy projects last year—a double retrospective CD, a Lyric Book, and a Tribute Album (Link of Chain) featuring Bonnie Raitt, Loudon Wainwright III, Josh Ritter, Dave Alvin, Tim O'Brien, Patty Larkin and many others.

And his secret for surviving in the industry for so long? "Don't get too famous too fast," he says. "I think half of it is just staying interested yourself. I love to play. I write the songs and make the records so I can perform, because I simply love to get out and recreate the songs in front of people."

"Still On the Levee," the double-CD retrospective, features fresh new takes on 24 iconic songs from his vast career, including "Devil Got Your Man," the first song he ever penned.

Meanwhile, "Chris Smither Lyrics 1966-2012" is a lyric book that features his complete set of lyrics complemented by select images of Smither and performance memorabilia from his decades-long career.

"Looking back, I have a lot more confidence now in what I do. It's gotten to the point now that I know within certain parameters what I can and can't do," Smither says. "For me, it took a long time to realize the relationship with the audience is not adversarial. They are on your side and once you accept that fact, the whole thing becomes more of a joy."

In December, Smither was recuperating after getting a new heart valve, but he says that's not going to stop him from performing. In fact, on March 5, Smither will be performing at The Barns at Wolf Trap, in a show that will cover all five decades of his career.

"Each song is like a little story that I venture out on and I show up in between the songs to talk to the audience," he says. "There might be one or two new songs because I've been working on some new things. It will be a competent and enjoyable performance."

The 71-year-old is seeing people of all ages at his shows these days, and is thrilled that people who have followed him his whole career still come out, as well as younger folks.

"People come up to me after the show and tell me that their parents raised them on my music," Smither says. "That's somewhat alarming to hear, although if I do the math, I know it's true."

The New Orleans-raised troubadour was born in Miami during World War II, but moved to Louisiana early in life, and it was his uncle that taught him the rudiments of instrumentation on a ukulele of all things.

"Uncle Howard showed me that if you knew three chords, you could play a lot of the songs you heard on the radio. And if you knew four chords, you could pretty much rule the world," Smither says.

Smither was an anthropology student at Mexico City University when his roommate introduced him to the music of Lightnin' Hopkins. From there, he became obsessed with the blues.

"I'd loved acoustic music—specifically the blues—ever since I first heard Lightnin' Hopkins' 'Blues In My Bottle' album. I couldn't believe the sound Hopkins got," he says.

So, he put his anthropology dreams aside and decided to take a crack at music instead, heading to Boston in the mid-'60s. It was there that he began long friendships with the likes of Bonnie Raitt and legendary folk singer Eric von Schmidt.

Smither became a quick favorite on the scene. His first two albums, "I'm A Stranger, Too!" and "Don't It Drag On" were critical and popular successes. He continued releasing albums and by the early '90s, his steady nationwide touring and regular release of consistently acclaimed albums cemented his reputation as one of the finest acoustic musicians in the country.

He still writes all the time and new songs can come to him anywhere—even at sound checks.

"I might be doing a little guitar riff and it sounds kind of neat, and you gradually get a collection of these things," Smither says. "I do set times for myself at home to write; putting myself into a room for three hours and not allowing myself to come out. It actually works."

Smither appreciates all his fans and those who have helped him be a success for more than five decades, and someday when people look back at the music annals, he hopes to simply be remembered.

"I compare it to a literary course, where you might learn about a particular time period and studying all the giants of the era, but then there's five to 10 minor poets of the age, and that's me," he says. "I just want a mention!"

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
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Dream Weaver

When Hillary Steel first took a weaving class in college, she had a strong reaction to it: "I hated it," she recalls. "But I went back to it and once I started learning it, it was something I gravitated towards."

Today, Steel specializes in weaving and resist dyeing, incorporating ikat and shibori (jaspe and amarras) into her hand woven wall pieces.

"It's always surprising. I have 30 years in and I'm still learning things all the time," she says. "It's a very engaging technical process and I've been able to learn a lot about it over time."

Steel received a Bachelor of Arts degree from the State University of New York at Buffalo. After graduation, she studied textiles via post-baccalaureate course work at Buffalo State College and the University of Pittsburgh as well as through travel to Cote d'Ivoire, Peru, Chile and Mexico.

"I've also studied a lot of traditional textiles from all over the globe—through books, museums and my own travels," she says. "I enhanced what I learned initially—the technical aspects—and adapted a lot of the approaches I gleaned from world textile history."

She feels the field is so rich and engaging because of its importance historically.

"For humans, it goes way back, and pretty much everybody all over the world relied on weaving to create what they needed to ease their lives and keep themselves warm," Steel says. "You learn a lot about anthropology and history and different cultures."

Over the years, her work has gotten more complex, and a project can take anywhere from a few months to as much as five years to develop and get it just right.

"Generally, I start with some kind of idea and drawings and I find as I work on it, things shift and change and rarely look as I initially intended it," she says. "I start with black and white thread and I do a lot of black and white dying prior to the threads even getting to the loom."

Once the weaving begins, Steel imagines the cloth as a canvas, and she sometimes adds more color, cuts the cloth, folds and manipulates and eventually reconstructs it all by stitching it together. On average, she weaves 25 yards of cloth per project.

"I'm inspired by life. I see these as narrative," Steel says. "They are fairly abstract and I think they're very common life experiences. They are stories and people should take out of them what they feel."

During her career, Steel's work has been included in national and international exhibitions including at the North American Cultural Center in San Jose, Costa Rica, the American Consulate





in Tijuana, Mexico, and at our Embassy in Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso. Her textiles have been the subject of solo shows at the Glenview Mansion Art Gallery, the Hoyt Institute of Fine Arts, and the Rosewood Centre Arts Gallery, and are included in the book, "Art on the Edge, Seventeen Contemporary American Artists."

Since 2006, along with colleague Virginia Davis, Steel has been studying with and documenting the work of Mexican master rebozo weaver Don Evaristo Borboa Casas and the two artists have produced a film about his work.

A textile artist who uses the traditional Mexican backstrap weaving technique to creative contemporary works with a modernist sensibility, Steel is also well known in the McLean community as a longtime art teacher at the Potomac School.

She received a Masters in Teaching degree from the Maryland Institute College of Art in Baltimore and has worked in public and private schools in Pennsylvania, Maryland and the Washington D.C. metropolitan area as an artist in residence, creating site-specific collaborative textiles with students.

"I've been teaching in Mexico most recently, and what I try to impart to all of my students is the reverence of the importance of art in culture and the role of the artist," Steel says. "I think to know how to work with one's hands and manipulate materials is really important and I fear we've kind of lost that a little bit. I do try to get that across to kids in particular."

The artist has lived in Montgomery County, Maryland since 1994, and maintains a studio in Takoma Park, Washington D.C.

Steel will be exhibiting some of her work at the McLean Community Center's Emerson Gallery from April 21 through June 4.

"There will be a lot of my large pieces, which rarely get shown together, so that's going to be nice to see them all in one space," she says. She will also be presenting a lecture/workshop about her



work during the run of the show and showing the documentary film she made about her Mexican master weaver mentor.

Listening to Dr. Vanessa Vergnetti, one quickly senses the passion with which she approaches the mission of Sagebrush, an addiction treatment center she founded about seven years ago. As a naturopathic doctor, Vergnetti and her team seek to treat patients using a customized holistic approach, addressing body, mind, and spirit to identify and eliminate the root causes of addiction.

The center focuses on the needs of each individual because every patient responds and recovers in different ways. A variety of programs are used including group therapy, individual therapy (at least once a week for every patient), EMDR therapy, experiential therapy, psycho-drama. Music and art therapy are also incorporated as well as acupuncture, hypnotherapy, and massage therapy. Where appropriate, Sagebrush likes to hold family sessions or couples sessions to support both the patient and their families.

"Addiction is a comprehensive illness that affects the whole individual—body, mind, soul, family, community, workplace," explains Dr. Vergnetti. "For example, the problem could be emotional, but what about nutrition? How can you build a healthy body if you're not getting the proper fuel? Most of our patients come to us malnourished, without proper nutrition to heal. Our residential food program is nutritionally rich with a diverse diet of high-quality food. We look at proper diet and food as medicine. Addiction does not need to be treated with medications, although in some cases they may needed occasionally. The body can heal itself as long as it has what it needs. We believe our nutrition is the best in the country and in fact, I am the only naturopathic doctor running an addiction center."

Dr. Vergnetti opened Sagebrush seven years ago in Great Falls with an eight-bed residential treatment facility. This was expanded to include outpatient facilities a couple of years later, and then a large outpatient clinic was added in Tysons.

Both are open seven days a week. They are preparing to open another facility in Vienna. Sagebrush has 45 employees, with eight independent contractors and the rest being full-time staff.

As Vergnetti prepared to design her center, she found that most treatment centers are hospital-based, which are not conducive to the healing that needs to happen. "Out of frustration, I decided that I could do better for this population," she recalls. "Many in this area do not want a lower-level treatment environment. They are higher-functioning and their needs are different. We respect our clients and want to offer a place that is comfortable and homey, warm, and soft." There are no plastic chairs for patients in these facilities.

Patients come from direct referrals by hospitals, physicians, and psychiatrists. Sometimes Sagebrush hears directly from a patient or someone who cares about the patient, like a family member or employer. Once the connection has been made, the client meets with a therapist who determines what level of care is needed and how much. The center offers residential treatment, partial hospitalization or intensive outpatient treatment. The intensive outpatient arrangement allows for those who must continue to work or maintain family obligations. The center can arrange evening or weekend schedules as the intended treatment permits.

When asked about the future, Vergnetti says, "We are growing. We have just added new staff and we have expanded our outpatient space. And there is the Vienna facility being planned. Let's face it,



the need is not going down. As the premiere facility with the most integrative and creative clinical services, Sagebrush will continue to bring the best treatment possible for our clients."

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






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The enchanting cuisine of Thailand, thousands of miles away in Southeast Asia, has emerged in recent years as a culinary standout in many corners of the globe, with a fascinating mingling of delicate flavors which garner the moniker the French cuisine of the Orient.

CHIENGMAI. THE MOUNTAINOUS NORTH

In the northernmost province of Thailand, Chiengmai rests in a valley dominated by the towering Inthanon Peak near the Burmese border at an elevation of 1,000 feet above sea level. The climate of Chiengmai is divided into a rainy season, hot season, and mild, but foggy winter, and is cooler than the rest of Thailand. This has an influence on the cooking of the north, which is milder than the hot, spicy dishes in subtropical regions such as Bangkok, but to the American palate, the dishes are still flavorful and spicy. Chiengmai offers the best teak, silver, and silk in Thailand, and produces cantaloupes, apples, and strawberries.

Tom Kha Gai and Tom Yum Goong are rich, savory soups with a base of chicken broth, flavored with lemongrass, Chinese parsley, mushrooms, and cayenne pepper one with chicken, coconut milk, and galanga root, the other adorned with shrimp. The galanga root is from a tree similar to a bird of paradise, but with a fragrant, beautiful brown and white flower. Tom Kha Gai is a perfect hot, savory soup on a wintry day, in the mountains of northern Thailand or here in Virginia.

Tom Kha Gai

(Per serving)

1 cup chicken broth 1/4 cup sliced chicken

1 stalk lemongrass

1/8 cup coconut milk

1 piece of galanga root

1/8 cup sliced onion

1/8 cup sliced mushrooms

or straw mushrooms

1 finely chopped scallion

1 T. Chinese parsley (cilantro)

2 T. fish sauce

2 T. lemon or lime juice

pinch of cayenne pepper

Combine ingredients in saucepan and bring to a boil. Remove lemongrass

stalk and galanga root and serve hot.

TO BANGKOK. THE HEART OF THAILAND


The people of Bangkok have taken to the water, where one can catch the "boat buses" that frequent the Chao Phaya River. One light, crispy Thai treat is spring rolls, with minced pork and shrimp with a not too sweet-and-sour tangy sauce. Spicy Duck is a popular Thai appetizer, shredded duck with an intriguing and fragrant blend of Kaffir lime leaves, red chili paste, and scallions, served over lettuce. Another fine Thai specialty is Charbroiled Rockfish, wrapped in banana leaves, stuffed with fresh Thai herbs, served with a spicy Thai sauce. The mingled aroma of banana and freshly charbroiled fish hits you as soon as you open the banana leaves. Followed by fresh fruit in season, like mango with sticky rice, a Thai meal is always an interesting mélange of flavor.

Thai curry is hot and spicy, red or green, and eaten all over Thailand. Curry Beef Panang is a Thai-style curry, blended from peanut, red curry and coconut. Green curry paste, a mixture of small Thai red chili peppers, garlic, red onion, lemon grass stalks, galanga slices, and the Kaffir lime leaves, is easily obtained already made at most local Thai groceries, although some prefer to blend their own.

Thai Green Curry with Beef (For 2) 1/2 can (2 oz.) green curry paste 1 T. cooking oil 1/2 lb. thinly-sliced beef 1/2 pint coconut milk, or more, to taste 1 t. sugar 2 t. fish sauce 6 baby Thai eggplants or 1/2 cup bamboo shoots 1/2 cup fresh Thai basil, (1 small bag) 2 Kaffir lime leaves slivers of hot red pepper (optional) Thai jasmine rice Mix green curry paste with cooking oil in skillet and cook for one minute. Mix in coconut milk and bring to a boil. Add beef, bamboo shoots or baby eggplants, Kaffir lime leaves, fish sauce, sugar, and fresh Thai basil leaves, stirring as the mixture cooks. Cook five minutes and serve over rice. For more color or more spice, slivered red pepper may be added to taste.

AND SOUTH, TO THE GULF OF THAILAND

Thailand is a land of beautiful beaches. Hua Hin is a weekend getaway for the people of Bangkok. Lined with coconut trees, it was historically a fishing village. Still unspoiled, mostly locals or other native Thai visitors frequent Hua Hin.





Many authentic Thai dishes are recipes handed down through families for generations. There is a great variety in the dishes from the regions of Thailand, with many seafood specialties from the south coast. Condiments allow diners to adjust the "heat" of the dish to their palate.

Beyond the traditional satays, tender chunks of skewered grilled chicken, Thai cuisine offers interesting starters such as Kanom Jeeb, crabmeat and minced pork wrapped in springroll skin, steamed and served with spicy Thai sauce, and Nua Sawan, marinated thin slices of beef, ovendried and fried, served with Thai sauce. Shrimp Kapow, or Basil Shrimp, from the Thai word krapow meaning basil, is an easyto-prepare favorite. This highly versatile recipe can be prepared with seafood, such as shrimp or scallops, fish, beef, pork, or

Shrimp Kapow or Chicken Kapow

(Stir-fried shrimp or chicken with Thai basil, chili and garlic)

1 lb. of shrimp, peeled and deveined, or 2 chicken breasts, boneless and skinless

1 T. vegetable oil fresh garlic

1 T. minced fresh Kee Noo chili

2 T. fish sauce (Nam Pla)

2 T. chicken broth (water may be substituted)

1 T. dark soy sauce

1 T. sugar

1 cup Thai basil leaves (Bai Kapow)

1 T. sliced Chee Fah chili

Slice the chicken breasts into thin, bite-sized pieces. Heat a wok or large skillet over medium heat. Add the vegetable oil and roll it around to cover the surface. Check the heat of the oil by dropping a piece of garlic into the pan. If it sizzles immediately, the oil is ready. Add the garlic and Kee Noo chili to the pan, and swirl it with spatula until garlic begins to turn golden (approximately 15 seconds). Add chicken or shrimp and stirfry it until the meat is half-cooked (approximately 1 minute). Add fish sauce, broth, and soy sauce, stir-fry for 1 minute. Add sugar, basil and sliced Chee Fah chili to taste and toss until the basil begins to wilt. Transfer to a serving plate, served with steamed rice. 💠

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
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The Metro's MAGNIFICENT MURAL

Chances are, if you've walked past the Greensboro Metro Station in Tysons over the past couple of months, you've been privy to work by one of our area's most noted artists—the internationally acclaimed Lawrence Atoigue, known as Naturel in the art community.

Since December, Naturel has been working on a 20 foot by 78 foot mural that will be a focal point for the Silver Line Metro Station. And while snow has slowed him down a little, the project is expected to be complete by the time this issue goes to press.

In the mural, through latex and spray paint, surrealistic water lilies will be rendered in a futuristic blend of pop and cubism.

During his career, Naturel has produced commercial art campaigns with Mountain Dew and Hpnotiq and has done work for everyone from LeBron James to Rihanna to Spike Lee. He's exhibited in Miami and other cities, but this is his first large project in his hometown.

"I'm from the area, and it was a long journey for me to come and be able to leave my mark here," Naturel says. "Primarily, D.C. was built on the title basin and the aquatic life around here

is something that I wanted to capture, but also take a stab at Monet."

The artist came to the project thanks to Shane Pomajambo, founder of Art Whino, a D.C.-based art gallery whose mission is to bring together the pioneers and freshest talent from around the world.

"I created the gallery to attract artists to an art scene that's typically found in California and New York—very much pop surrealism and murals—and I've done numerous events over the last nine years, painting over 130 murals in the D.C. area," Pomajambo says. "It just so happened, I had an opportunity in Fairfax County, and being a resident of Great Falls, I was very excited to be given the chance to do something in the area."

When the Tysons Partnership was looking for someone to do a mural, they contacted Pomajambo.

"They told me they had this big white wall and a big blank wall in the Metro Station, and of course, people when they get off a Metro, would rather see a piece of art," he says. "You don't normally see a space that large for a mural. I work with a number of national and international artists and as luck would have it, a friend introduced me to Naturel."

Because of his work in New York, Pomajambo didn't realize that Naturel was based in D.C., but once he found out he lived in Virginia, he reached out to him about this great project.

Once they connected, Naturel was excited about the possibility and the two discussed what the best design would be.



"I was at the gallery with Shane and he was asking me what I wanted to do, and I told him there's a common theme I like to go back to when I have the creativity and freedom to do something, and it's always been these water lilies," Naturel says. "I wanted to do something that was equally

beautiful and simple for people to get, but also technical. The water lily theme to me, combines all of that."

That was just what Pomajambo had in mind.

"When you do art like this for the people, it's extremely important to do something that's far reaching. You don't want two ninjas fighting it out on a wall," Pomajambo says. "He does a lot more abstract work and I thought that was quite important for this project. His geometrical style is definitely more broad reaching."

Pomajambo notes that in the D.C. area, this is a unique project because there's not much of a mural pop-art scene, and even less of one in Fairfax County.

"I'm hoping this will be the beginning of more people seeing how cool it is, and then we'll have a whole bunch of art in the Tysons Corner community," he says. "I want to be able to bring a lot of attention and hype to the art community, which I think is important."

Naturel will also have an exhibit at the Art Whino Gallery in April and has other things in the work in the District in 2016. For more information on the artist, visit allburgundy.com. For information on the gallery, visit www.art whinocom. §

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THE TASTEVIN

The shallow, faceted cup sometimes worn by some sommeliers was originally designed for winemakers to taste wine. Some sommeliers open a bottle of wine tableside and take a small taste in their tastevin to ensure it is not flawed.



Dining in some of our area's finer establishments, you may encounter an in-house sommelier. In case you've ever wondered why they are there and how to use them, we've taken a moment to uncork the secrets to using their experience to your advantage.

WHAT IS A SOMMELIER?

A sommelier, or wine steward, is a professional trained in the art of wine service, as well as wine and food pairing. This person may be responsible for selecting the wines, developing the wine list, and may work with the chefs to suggest and pair wines with the menu. Working with patrons, the sommelier assists in selecting wines to match personal taste preferences, pairings and budgets.

To be a sommelier, several years of formal education, apprenticeship, or experience are required, and a professional sommelier can rise through the ranks, or degrees, by passing examinations at the various levels to become a Master Sommelier, although most do not.

According to Vincent Feraud, sommelier and wine director at the Ritz-Carlton Tysons Corner, "A sommelier is someone who recommends the right wine for the right person and the right taste to have with dinner."

"Many people are afraid that the sommelier is going to try to sell them expensive wines, but our job is to make our guests comfortable and help them choose wine they can afford. You don't want to embarrass the guest at the table," he continued.

The issue of price can be a touchy one, yet can be subtly approached by pointing to a particular wine on the wine list. This gives the sommelier your price point. Or you can simply tell the sommelier, "I don't want to go over \$70."

HOW TO USE A SOMMELIER

A sommelier's job is to help you narrow down the choices from a sometimesoverwhelming wine list and create a perfect pairing with your meal, however, there are things you can do to help him or her.

- Y Know a little bit about your preferences. Do you prefer a particular wine region, vintage or type of grape?
- Talk briefly about what you liked or didn't like about your wine choices in the past. Offer the names of particular wines you've enjoyed.
- F Know what food you're ordering.

If people are new to wines, Feraud begins by determining their basic taste preferences, asking if they like something fruity or light, for example. He likes to introduce people to wine with something smooth or fruity to start, then once they begin to develop a palate, suggests more aggressive profiles like those that are drier or include more tannins.

His most important tip: "Get your palate excited first—eat a piece of meat or a vegetable and then drink the wine after you eat. Most people do this backwards and drink the wine first," he said.

Those who are more knowledgeable in wines can give the name of a wine they've enjoyed in the past and ask for suggestions from the in-house wine list. This gives the sommelier both the price point and the style of wine.

WINE SERVICE SECRETS

There's more to serving wine than just appearing with the bottle. "A sommelier has to know how to handle the bottle from the cellar to the table," Feraud said. Proper handling includes how to carry the bottle to control its sediment, how to open it, care to take with the cork, proper serving temperature, and even how full to fill a glass or ensure everyone at the table gets served equally from the single bottle, for example.

"Mostly, we want the service to go smoothly, and this entails working together with the host," he continued. "My job is not to give a lecture about the wine; rather, it is to make the guests comfortable and help them have a good time." *



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You have to go way back to 1871 to uncover the beginnings of the Vienna Presbyterian Church, when nine Vienna residents embarked on building the church (which now serves as VPC's chapel). Back then, VPC had a tiny congregation with little more than a 100 members, but by 1976 membership had grown to more than 1,300 and this little village church now had a thriving suburban congregation.

Today VPC is the largest Presbyterian Church in the Washington, D.C., area. It's comprised of a senior pastor (Reverend Dr. Peter G. James) and two associate pastors; more than 2,600 members; a wide range of study, fellowship, service and support opportunities; a deeply involved congregation, and an extensive local, national, and international missions outreach.

Those who live in and around Vienna know VPC to be an institution of the area—both for its services and youth programs, groups and networks.

Shannon Jordan, director of adult ministries, is in charge of the different groups and classes for adults, supporting volunteers and leaders of the groups, and informing new members about what's available.

"When someone comes to a church and they are looking for a class or group or way to serve, I am the liaison to do that," she says. "I also coordinate the big learning or teaching events that we have here."

For adults, everything from basic Bible studies to book groups to support groups for divorce are available.

"We also have support groups for those who are grieving; parenting classes; and classes to help with more intentional spiritual formation for those who want to go deeper spiritually," Jordan says. "We have a renewing prayer ministry, and other one-on-one caring help on hand."

One popular group is the Monday night Men's Great Steakout, where they cook steaks and the men come in and hear speakers. Guests have included U.S. Astronauts, Washington Redskins players





and prominent business leaders. That same night, the women have a Bible study group that's very well attended.

Jordan feels that the church is an important part of Vienna and the community.

"The people that come and get engaged and find a group or class, can make some really wonderful relationships here," she says. "I love how when someone has a family crisis or an illness or something, the group comes around and really comforts that person and that family until they get back on their feet. I think that's one of the best things about us."

Additionally, Jordan says there are a number of opportunities for mission work

and helping the community both in Vienna and across the state—plus Haiti and Mexico—and people can connect with that and feel as if they are a part of something bigger and make a difference in someone's lives.

"Every Sunday morning, we have people manning the Connect Table in the lobby, and they will help people connect right there or collect their information and I will call them later and help them find what they're looking for, or connect them with the person who can best help them with whatever their goal is," Jordan says. "We have wonderful people here and wonderful ways for people to get engaged."

VPC is also well known in the community because of its youth ministry and a lot of people come in because it's a great place for kids to connect as well.

Kim Snyder, children's ministry senior manager, heads up the staff that works with volunteers to head up the youth programs.

"Sunday mornings is when most of the children's programs happen," Snyder says. "We offer classes during the worship services and have a variety of programs between K and 6th grade. We have age-group classes and a fun program that helps kids engage with the message of the bible."

There's also a once-a-month kid's club that is open to children, where they can hang out with people their age and have fun building community. Once they move up to middle school, 7th through 12th graders are involved in breakout classes and discuss the worship with speakers and among themselves.


"The older kids have youth group times on Sunday evenings. It's a lot of fun and games and a really great way for people to meet each other," Snyder says. "They also have small group Bible studies which are really special to us. Those not only help them dive deeper into scripture, but to grow in their faith beyond what they may have learned."

For those who like to sing, there are children's choirs that happen on Sunday mornings and a Youth Choir that practices a bit more.

In Snyder's opinion, VPC is a light in the community and continually tries to be a larger light.

"There's an opportunity to serve in our town and reach out to neighbors, whether they're Christians or not," she says. "One of the neat things the Family Ministry does is run a day camp at an elementary school for anyone who wants to be a part of it. It helps kids build friends and gives families a chance to get kids out of the house when they might not have been able to afford something like that.

"We want to be more than just ourselves; we don't want to be just inside our little building," she adds. "We have a wider influence than just Vienna alone and we look to expand that as much as we can and do the greater good." •



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CIRCA 1960'S SPLIT-LEVEL REINVENTED IN A SPACIOUS NEOCLASSICAL STYLE

To expand a home's main living area, Sun Design Remodeling added a 300 square-foot addition, introduced a front verandah with foyer, and elaborated the whole house in an entirely new architectural language.

n 1984, Jack and Marie Torre purchased a circa 1960's split-level on a half acre lot in Fairfax. At nearly 3,000 square-feet, it was a perfect spot to settle down and raise two children. The schools nearby were excellent; there was an easy commute to work, but there were some things about the property the Torres thought they might improve—should they stay in residence long enough.

A cabinet-cluttered kitchen with builder grade finishes, for instance; no powder room on the home's main level; space-restricted dining room.

Skip ahead almost two decades, though, and the whole house remodel by Sun Design Remodeling that the public was invited to see earlier this month firmly demonstrates the kind of sweeping improvements that can occur when owners set their sights on new possibilities.

In fact: the former split-level is no longer merely a house. It's the Torre's long-term residence, and one that is both substantially larger and iterated in a completely new architectural language

"The ideal of long-term ownership is the option to create a residence that becomes more supportive of favored activities and aesthetic preferences," says Craig Durosko, founder and chariman of Sun Design Remodeling. "We are finding this kind of on-going commitment to personalizing a residence much more frequently than in decades past."

Durosko was at the house January 9 to greet neighbors who wanted to learn more about whole house remodeling. Sun

Design guided the Torres through every step of a comprehensive makeover. Many guests seem surprised at the project's scope; that the vision had such continuity and coherence.

The Torres, meanwhile, are quick to acknowledge that Sun Design's architectural solution came as a revelation—especially since they had hired architects on two separate occasions to develop plans that soon proved infeasible.

"We couldn't add onto the rear because of set-back restrictions," Jack Torre explains. "The bigger problem, though, was a six-foot roof overhang in front, and the seven steps required to walk from the ground level foyer to the primary living area. Because of these factors, we thought we were prohibited from enlarging the foyer, or expanding our living space around the kitchen."

More recently, with their life as emptynesters imminent, the couple was actively considering relocation. A chance visit to a remodeled split-level by Sun Design not far from their house, however, convinced Marie to once again consider the remodeling option.

Shortly after the viewing, the Torres set up a meeting with Sun Design's president Bob Gallagher, and several previously unconsidered options emerged. At the top of the "wish list," the couple wanted a larger, more functional kitchen, plus a larger dining room with distinctive formal elements, including a tray ceiling.

There should be a dedicated family room with a view of the tree-lined back yard, and a spacious powder room on the same floor as the kitchen.

The substantially enlarged gourmet kitchen envisioned would require a butler's pantry, and a wine refrigerator.

Still more challenging: the couple wanted to enter their home's primary living area directly from the front door rather than ascending seven steps within a cramped ground-level foyer.

With these goals articulated, the problem for the design team was how best to implement critical components within a well-integrated whole.

Since new enclosed space couldn't be added on the rear, the east side of the house was designated for the new dining room/sitting room wing.

Still more problematic: under the current floor plan template, one entered the house from a narrow front foyer—ascending to a main level hall that segued to the living room (left), a set of staircases heading in two directions (right), or the kitchen straight ahead.

What lacked, Gallagher observes, was a "procession" in which rooms unfold in an orderly, inviting sequence, even as sight lines coax the eye with intriguing visual continuum.

"The structural issue was finding an optimal way raise the front door to the main level of the house," Gallagher recalls.

"This would require extending the front foyer eight feet to get past the existing roof overhang. We also needed to re-design the front elevation to better rationalize the difference between the grade at ground-level and the home's main living area—a distance of about seven feet."

What evolved was not merely a larger foyer, but an improved and more appropriate architectural context in the form of a spacious, classically apportioned front verandah that surrounds and presents the front entrance to the home.

"We were delighted as the plans for the front elevation began to shape up," recalls Marie Torre. "It's a completely new architectural style, yet perfectly accommodates the square footage we needed to reconfigure the interior of the main living area."

The resulting interior revolves around two comparatively modest additions, albeit, enclosed spaces that substantially enlarge the home's main level.

The 44 square-foot foyer now situated on a new front porch is perfectly aligned with a front door that opens directly into a center hall, setting up entry into the living room or kitchen just a few feet beyond.

Meanwhile, the 300 square feet added to the home's west side houses a formal dining room and an adjacent rear-of-the house sitting area.

The room includes a two-sided fireplace also visible in the living room. The enlarged kitchen accommodates a custom-designed banquette and multiple storage pantries.

Marie says the gourmet kitchen now in place provides spaces for all her cooking utensils, even items that used to be stored in the basement. Moreover, replacing the roof over the main living area and raising the roof from eight feet to nine feet makes the room feel substanially larger.

Better yet, the remade rear elevation—which includes a bump-out with three divided light windows and relocated French doors—invites abundant natural light.

"This is really a completely different house," says Marie, "But one that is much more satisfying to occupy."

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



Tucked inconspicuously in the newly thriving neighborhood of Westover on Washington Blvd., Thai Noy, long known for its gracious hospitality, has been warmly welcoming locals through its doors to enjoy tantalizing Thai cuisine for the last seventeen years. Artwork depicting scenes of Thai life grace the walls. Kathleen Drennan, a loyal Thai Noy fan describes the Larb Gai, a zesty appetizer of minced chicken tossed with red onion, scallions, fresh cilantro and a hint of fresh mint, ground roasted chili, and lime juice as the "perfect balance of heat, lime, and cilantro." The lightly scented Basil Chicken, or Chicken Kapow, stir-fried chicken with fresh minced hot peppers, red and green bell peppers, onions, and basil leaves, with its slight hint of sweetness, is a perennial favorite. Her take on the Rockfish with Emerald Sauce, a spicy green curry sauce, accompanied by green veggies, was that it was a "feast for the eyes and the palate." Garlic Shrimp stir-fried in a garlic sauce is a noteworthy Thai dish. Ginger Pork, prepared with fresh ginger root, red and green bell peppers, scallions, and ear mushrooms in a soybean sauce, is a popular selection, especially cooled off by a Thai Singha beer. Speaking of which, the beer and wine list is more extensive than you find at many a Thai restaurant. In the spring and summer months, you can opt to sip and dine on Thai Noy's relaxing outdoor patio.

The owner, Kot Symoukda, is affable and professional and picks up much of the fresh produce for the restaurant locally. Kathleen recounts, "I ran into Kot one day at Grand Mart and he had half a shopping cart full of Asian eggplant, which I love. I asked him how he was going to prepare it when I recognized him as the owner of Thai Noy, one of my favorite Thai restaurants. He was delightful." ❖



MCLEAN'S Capri Ristorante Italiano AN EXTRAORDINARY STORY OF

Capri Ristorante Italiano is a story of two families that started decades ago. The DeChiara family has been serving fine Italian food in restaurants around the world for generations. Nicky DeChiara collaborated with his brothers Renato and Enzo to open Capri in McLean, but the cooking started way before that.

GRATITUDE AND FAMILY DEVOTION

Nicky's grandfather had LaRue on Sunset Boulevard in Los Angeles. His uncle Romeo opened Chianti in L.A., very popular from the 1940s through the 1970s. Nicky opened Romeo and Juliet, named for his mother and uncle, in Washington, D.C. Then MGM's Kirk Kerkorian, visiting in 1976, asked Nicky to open a restaurant in L.A. like Romeo and Juliet, which he did in 1980. Because of the popularity of family restaurants La Rue, Chianti, and Romeo and Juliet, all of Hollywood came to the new restaurant.

In all, Nicky has opened 16 restaurants around the world, including D.C.'s Romeo and Juliet with his brothers, as well as restaurants in Bologna, Italy and Monte Carlo. He was also a creative consultant for Pazzo Pomodoro when they opened in Vienna.

Throughout many of those restaurant successes, one person in particular has played an ever-increasing role. Beatrice Zelaya started working for Nicky at Romeo and Juliet in D.C. 39 years ago. She started as a salad girl, working next to Nicky's mother, Juliet, and essentially grew up with the family. She has worked with other notable restaurateurs like Roberto Donna, Savino Recino, and Romeo Salta and was part of the openings of D.C.'s Galileo and Primi Piatti. Eventually, she went to Potomac to take over DeChiara's Renato restaurant, a Maryland landmark. Now Beatrice is at Capri in McLean, along with other family members.

A few years ago, Nicky and Enzo met to plan the future (Renato had passed away). Enzo's son, Michael, has a mental disability, meaning he needs extra care, although he works a regular job at Capri. As Nicky was retiring, he and Enzo decided to turn over the restaurant to Beatrice and her husband, Philippe. As Beatrice and Philippe agreed to look after Michael and keep him working at the restaurant, the DeChiaras donated the entire restaurant, the food inventory, even the cash in the drawer as a sign of gratitude for their commitment to Michael and the family.

This arrangement matches Nicky's idea of what a family restaurant should be—that is, one that continues in the family from generation to generation. Nicky says, "And that will continue for a long time to come. Beatrice has about 100 people in her family." Indeed, today Philippe and his brother, Demitri, are in the dining room. Beatrice is chef in the kitchen. Their daughter, Roberta, works the front, and even their granddaughter takes reservations. Officially retired, Nicky still can be found at the restaurant most days, checking on things, greeting old friends, but the heavy lifting is now in the hands of Beatrice and Philippe.

The menu, which has not changed, is inspired by the cooking from the Amalfi coast by the island of Capri where the DeChiaras come from. As one would expect, the menu includes outstanding seafood dishes such as the simple Grilled or Poached Salmon with olive oil and lemon sauce or Cappesante e Scampi "Bert Rosecan" (grilled jumbo scallops and shrimp served with a mild fra-diavolo sauce). There are several meat entrees featuring veal or chicken, and more than a dozen pasta dishes. Maybe one would choose Linguine con Gamberi, (linguine with shrimp, capers, asparagus, sundried tomatoes in a white wine sauce), or Ravioli di Grancho (medium square crabmeat ravioli wrapped in cracked pepper dough served with lobster and saffron.) The restaurant will gladly take any request for your favorite dishes. Many fine wines are available by the bottle, as well as several available by the glass.


We were honored to enjoy three incredible dishes. The Vitello Pizzaiola is a scallopine of veal served in a delicate tomato sauce creating an exquisite balance between meat and sauce. The Agnolotti is a home-made pasta filled with fresh spinach, imported ricotta and Parmesan cheese in a cream sauce. The delectable burst of flavor with the telltale taste of nutmeg swept me back to my most



recent visit to my inlaws' home in Emilia-Romagna. The Linguine Seafood included shrimp, calamari, mussels, and clams served with a reduction of fish fumet in a tomato sauce and served over linguine. It is truly a house specialty and one discovers so many flavors and textures in just a single dish.

The décor at Capri is suggestive of Nicky's time in California with light, pastel color and modern art. There is no hint of a restaurant that has been in one place for the 18 years it has existed, rather more like one year.

Capri Ristorante Italiano is located at 6825 Redmond Avenue in McLean. Take the escalator to the second floor. Reservations 703 288-4601 or online through Open Table. Go to caprimcleanya.com. 
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"Flowers have power, and serve as a universal language of emotion," echoes Hillary Staats, interior designer and owner of Sanctuary Interior Design Build. "People give flowers to celebrate, show compassion, offer thanks or gratitude, or say they're sorry, and can immediately increase the chi or positive energy in the home."

Flowers shouldn't be a special occasion item, consider having flowers all the time—in the interior, the exterior, and when entertaining.

Interior Howers

In her own home, Staats, a former floral designer, makes it a point to display fresh flowers. Although she most often places them on the kitchen table, coffee table and bedside stand, unusual places like a foyer or bathroom work as well.

Hillary's Vip To determine freshness, look for firm buds and stems that are not soggy, and learn which day of the week flowers are delivered.

Affordable flowers are available at most grocery stores, and Staats advises buying large quantities of the same type and color for the most impact. She recently purchased about 150 daisy stems for \$30. Lilies, roses and daisies, or potted plants like orchids create stunning interior arrangements.

Anything that holds water can become a container, so think creatively. Use a milk pitcher for a bouquet, or salt and pepper shakers as bud vases. Even one fresh flower can make a statement.

Don't forget that men like flowers too. "Men think it's romantic to have flowers in the house, and it can help them feel like their wife is more feminine," Staats said. "Men like to be around feminine things—more than they let on." Choose darker shades of reds or burgundy for men's flowers.

Exterior Howers

"Place container gardens by your front door; they're welcoming and offer a friendly first impression," Staats said. Her favorite shade flowers include impatiens in white or pink. "These colors pop out and will move forward, while a dark red will be recessive." For full sun, try petunias or hanging baskets. Simply pop off the hanging device and insert the basket into your planter.

Hillary's Tip

Don't be afraid to trim the stems to size; vase display should show 2/3 vase, 1/3 flower.

Other places to position flowers include near the back door or patio, and mailbox. "It's fun to plant a climbing plant like morning glory near the mailbox." Add color with hanging ferns on a screened in porch, window boxes off a railing, or flowering trees.

Flower and herb gardens also implant color. "Create a flowing border that snakes along the perimeter of your yard, and plant in groupings," she advised. "Sketch out a garden plan and take it to the store with you, but stick to a couple of colors." There's no rule as to which color. "Pick colors that make you happy."

Entertaining Flowers

"Flowers are expected when entertaining," Staats said. Use them on the dining and display tables or as a serving tray garnish, or include edible flowers in meal planning. Affix blooms to the chair backs, attach sweetheart roses to place cards, or lay roses across the women's plates.

"For a baby shower, buy 200 pink carnations and scatter arrangements around the house. Or for a picnic, place a bunch of daisies in jars or water glasses," she suggested.

sky's the limit for weddings!" Flowers are available in virtually every color of the rainbow, and often, dved flowers can be found to match any setting or theme. If you're indecisive, choose white; white is always elegant and goes with everything.

Now that the weather is warming up, it's time to think about flowers, and the powerful beauty they provide. *

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Hillary's Tip

Keep the arrangement low on the dining room table. Put your elbow on the table and make a fist; your centerpiece should be no higher than your fist.

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


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
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One of the questions we hear frequently is how to sell your home when you have a pet. After all, a pet is part of your family. You want to minimize the disruption showings may cause, while also ensuring your home is as appealing as possible. So, what's the best way to handle this situation?

First, it depends on the pet. Obviously, pets such as fish are not a problem at all. Cats and dogs can be managed, but other pets (like snakes and iguanas) are a bigger challenge. We have had all of these and more—including exotic birds who were allowed to roam freely in the house!

What you need to consider is whether or not you want to sell your home quickly and if the amount you sell for is important. Having pets can affect both. If you're looking to maximize profits and sell as fast as possible, we recommend having your pets out of the house during the first two weeks your home is on the market. This is when you will have the most showings.

If you're like me, that doesn't sound appealing. My dog Cody would not be happy with this solution. Maybe your pet would feel the same. You might think, My dog Fifi is the cutest thing ever; she would never hurt a fly. Why in the world would I need to send her over

to someone else's house to stay? Or worse yet, to a kennel?!

You don't need to do that unless selling your home quickly and for the most money matters to you. If you don't mind having your home on the market for a longer period, and you don't mind not maximizing the sale price, then don't worry about sending Fifi on an extended play date. If time and money are valuable to you, however, sending Fifi away would be best.

You may not like this advice, but as your Realtors, we feel strongly about our duty to represent you and your best interests. Here are some stories about real buyers we've experienced over the years. These situations are very common and why we recommend being pet-free while on the market:

- One buyer refused to enter—or even drive by—a home where pets were present. They required us to verify with the seller that there were no pets in the residence. If we found a perfect home to show them, they refused to see the house if a pet were present, even if the home was gorgeous and in pristine condition.
- Some buyers are afraid of dogs. Even if the dog is caged, some buyers won't enter a home if they hear it bark. If you're a dog lover, this may seem silly to you, but it doesn't matter if the fear is rational or not. The buyer's perception is your reality. Even if their agent convinces them to enter the home, the fear alone may prevent them from bonding with the house the way they would if they were relaxed.
- The worst situation we remember is showing a home with several cages of snakes...and one got out! I don't care how many times you tell a buyer not to worry because the snake is not poisonous, you are never going to get that buyer back in the house.

- Allergies are often a factor. If someone in the family has an animal allergy, it may mean they won't buy your house. Or, they may offer less money as they factor in the cost of replacing carpets and cleaning air ducts. Either way, you lose.
- Liability is always an issue. Your pet is probably very loving, quiet, and well-behaved when you're around. But when your home is on the market, your pet may respond differently when strangers are constantly invading.

The last thing you want is a lawsuit because Fifi nipped at a child while they were looking at your home.

National studies show that among the the top reasons a home doesn't sell—aside from price and condition—are smokers, heavy cooking odors, and pets.


The bottom line is: if you can find your pet a home away from home, you will improve your chances of selling quickly and for the most money. In the long run, this is best for Fifi, too!



I'm getting close to retirement—what should I do to prepare?

You should focus on two things:

- Estimate how much income you will need in retirement- usually when people retire
 their living expenses go down (such as commuting and clothing) but other expenditures
 (such as travel and medical expenses) may increase.
- Identify your sources of retirement income and their tax implications—including investment accounts, pensions, Social Security benefits and other assets like 401(k)'s and IRA's.

With this information you can create a plan for drawing down your retirement assets, this is called distribution planning. When taking distributions—which assets you sell, when you sell them, and how you allocate those assets—has a direct impact on how long your money will last.

Is there anything I can do to protect myself against market volatility during retirement?

That's a question a lot of people in or nearing retirement have right now. With all the recent market turmoil many people are worried that they will need to sell their investments when the market is low, and because of that, their savings won't last. This is where strategic planning comes in. Many people have heard that an investment portfolio should be more conservative as they near retirement, but don't understand the real purpose of this recommendation.

The reason to keep a portion of your retirement savings in reserve is to prevent being forced to sell investments when the market is low. I recommend that my clients in or near retirement keep 5-10 years' worth of distributions in bonds and in cash. That way they can avoid selling stock when the prices are low by taking distributions from the bonds and cash instead. The rest of the portfolio should be diversified among growth oriented investments.

What is the most important thing I should know when getting ready to retire?

It is essential to know your options and have a clear financial plan for your future. Having the right investments and knowing the best times for them to be drawn upon is a very large part of ensuring that your savings last.

Other strategic actions such as carefully timed Roth Conversions between retirement and age 70 can preserve more of your wealth and significantly reduce the amount of taxes you pay during retirement. Understanding your Social Security benefits and proper portfolio allocation can also have a big impact on your lifestyle.

Working with a financial advisor can help you identify and take advantage of your options before and after retirement. It is important to work with someone who has experience in retirement and distribution planning and who takes the time to understand your unique retirement needs.

I'm still 10+ years away from retirement- what should I be focusing on right now?

At 22 Motlagh married Rouhi, the love of his life, and this year they will celebrate their 65th anniversary. He was her tutor in school and they fell in love at first sight.



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
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ASK COACH Amy








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


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2: My dog keeps scratching his ear, and if I touch it, he yelps. He shakes his head more often lately, too. What could be the problem?

• Without examining your dog, I'd say it sounds like otitis externa (pronounced ohtight-us ecks-turn-ah), the medical term for a common ear infection. Otitis is one of the most common medical problems veterinarians see. The term "otitis externa" means ear (oti-) inflammation (-itis) localized to the outer ear canal (externa). Veterinary insurance companies report that otitis is consistently the number-one claim for dogs and in the top 10 claims for cats for many years running. In the following article, I'll discuss otitis in dogs and cats and what we can do to prevent it.

When pets have an ear infection, they often shake their heads vigorously or scratch around their ears or cheeks with their back feet. An infection can occur in one ear, but often both ears are affected. Early in the process, the skin of the ear canal is often red; however, if left untreated, the skin grows darker and pigmented and often develops a pebbled appearance, rather than the smooth, glistening skin you see normally. Usually, but not always, there is some sort of discharge present in the ear canal. It can be either dark or tan and waxy or it can be thin and look like pus. Otitis sufferers can display no discomfort, mild discomfort, or intense pain. If your dog has floppy ears, you'll have to lift the ear flap to see what's happening within the canal. The inflammation is easier to see in cats and in dogs with upright ears.

At the time your pet sees the veterinarian for the problem, the cause is usually an overgrowth of yeast, bacteria or both. Yeast and bacteria, typically Staph., are normal flora in the ear canal.

They're supposed to be there. When the environment in the ear canal isn't healthy or normal, however, normal flora can overgrow and create otitis.

Most cases of ear infections are a symptom of another disease, the most common of which is allergies. Animals can be allergic to environmental things such as pollens, molds, and house dust mites, or to foods, such as chicken, beef, dairy, corn, and wheat. Sometimes the cause is as simple as excess moisture in the ears from swimming or bathing. In some dogs with heavy, drooping ears, the excess moisture gets trapped, creating an unhealthy environment that allows yeast and/or bacteria to overgrow. Ear mites can also cause otitis, although mite infestations more often show up in puppies and kittens and typically don't recur.

When veterinarians see dogs and cats with frequent ear infections, we usually discuss the underlying, primary problems with our clients. If the dog swims or gets baths often, then the owner can instill an acidifying ear-cleaning solution into the ear afterwards to help prevent infection.

If drooping ears are causing the infection, then regular ear cleanings help keep the ear canal healthy.

The most common cause for recurrent otitis in dogs and cats is allergies. Sometimes allergic pets have other signs of allergies, such as skin infections, skin rashes, or areas of hair loss. Some allergic pets will chew or lick their feet or scoot on or chew their anal area. In some cases, however, the only sign of an allergy is recurrent otitis externa. The most common allergens are those that we can't avoid, unfortunately. Pollens from trees, grasses, and weeds are the most common allergens in the spring, summer, and fall, respectively. Molds are also common allergens and are more prevalent in the fall, although they are present in many homes, too, so they can cause year-round problems. This past fall was one of the worst for our allergic patients because of the warm, wet weather that persisted all the way until Christmas. Our odd weather pattern in late 2011 created a higher level of molds outside, especially in wet leaves, so we saw skin and ear problems much later into winter than normal.

Food allergies often cause skin problems in dogs and cats, too. They can also cause chronic vomiting and/or diarrhea, but that reaction is most often the result of diet sensitivity, rather than a true allergy.

Red, itchy ears without an underlying infection are the most classic signs of allergic otitis externa. Typically the bacterial or yeast overgrowth develops over time, and early in the process, the infection probably isn't there. We often see a yeast otitis that started as an allergic problem. We sometimes figure out the issue because medication eradicates the infection, but the problem recurs. In these cases, it's clear there's another, underlying cause for the otitis.

How can we prevent our pets from developing ear infections? Let's start with cats, because the feline solution is easy. If they don't have ear mites and they have recurrent otitis, they almost certainly have an underlying allergy. To fix their problem, first focus on ruling out a food allergy with a carefully controlled diet trial, assuming the problem is non-seasonal. If eliminating possible allergens from the diet doesn't help, discuss allergen-testing options with your cat's veterinarian.

For dogs, the answer is only a little more complex. Floppy-eared dogs, such as Bassett hounds, cocker spaniels, and many retrievers, can benefit from maintenance ear cleanings with an acidifying solution available from your veterinarian or over the counter. Keeping the ear dry, acidic, and clean can prevent an overgrowth of organisms that normally live in the ear. Preventing recurrent otitis in canines requires owners to look for the underlying allergy. If the problem is seasonal and infrequent, simply treating the occasional infection with medication can be a reasonable option. For pups with frequent or very painful problems, however, it's much healthier to work on the primary problem to help prevent the secondary otitis.

Please talk to your pet's veterinarian if your furry friend is having frequent ear problems. With persistence, patience and teamwork, recurrent otitis can be resolved. Thankfully, routine otitis is easy enough to fix with medication from your pet's doctor. .



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CROSSING THE AIRPORT ACCESS HIGHWAY

First of seven straddle bents erected using 49 truckloads of concrete

rews working on Phase 2 of the Dulles Corridor Metrorail Project have successfully completed a significant construction operation, by pouring 473 cubic yards of concrete needed to construct a large "straddle bent" over the Dulles International Airport Access Highway.

A straddle bent supports a structure that spans a particularly wide area where piers cannot be used directly beneath the span.

Massive concrete operations require significant coordination between project crews and the airport.

The work on January 8 required 49 truckloads of concrete, and caused minimal interruptions to eastbound traffic along the Access Highway. The concrete pour took about 6.5 hours to complete, including preparation time.

"Completion of the straddle bent signals a major step forward," according to Charles Stark, executive director of the rail project.

To ensure structural integrity, several tests are conducted prior to pouring the concrete. Test cylinders are poured and post-tensioning cables are tested to confirm compliance.

As the project continues, it will require seven additional large straddle bents on or near airport property, including two more over the eastbound Access Highway lanes and one over the westbound lanes. This work is scheduled to be completed by the third quarter of 2016. Work on the four remaining straddle bents over the eastbound lanes of the Dulles Greenway is projected to begin in late 2016.

"The use of straddle bents enables(?) us to span significant roadways or environmental features," said Keith Couch, project director for Capital Rail Constructors, the joint venture of Clark Construction and Kiewit Infrastructures South, the contractor executing the design-build contract for the second phase of the Silver Line.

Phase 2 runs from Wiehle avenue in Rerston west throught Herndon, Dulles Airport and to Ashburn in eastern Loundoun County.

ART IN TRANSIT COMES TO SPRING HILL STATION



Tave you noticed that tall ice cream cone along Route 7 near the Spring Hill Metrorail Station?

It's not really an ice cream cone but its erection stopped traffic on a cold post Blizzard 2016 night when Dulles Project Metrorail crews hoisted the structure into place on the south side of 7 near the Honda dealership and next to an entrance pavilion to the Spring Hill station.

It's a sculpture!



It's part of the rail project's Art in Transit program.

Designed by Barbara Grygutis, a well-known public art creator, the piece is not quite finished. Soon the cone will be multi-colored and a lighted beacon along this busy roadway in a patio area at the station. Watch carefully as this area changes as work progresses over the coming months. *

TUNNEL TO TERMINAL CLOSES BECAUSE OF RAIL CONSTRUCTION

Shuttles to provide service for some Dulles passengers

ravelers accustomed to using a tunnel to get from one of the two daily parking garages to get to and from the main terminal at Washington Dulles International Airport now must use shuttle buses.

The tunnel to Garage 1 has been closed to allow for construction of the Dulles Airport Metrorail Station, a key part of Phase 2 of the Silver Line.

Signs in the garage and terminal now guide travelers to the

The tunnel will re-open in approximately two years.

When this portion of the rail line opens in approximately four years, passengers will access the terminal from directly from the new Metrorail station and the parking garage via the reconstructed tunnel which will include moving walkways. Airport officials have promised to do everything to minimize any disruptions to the traveling public because of the twoyear closing. *
